The Omiya Bonsai Art Museum, Saitama

Bonsai trees are an inherent part of Japanese traditional culture, and for those of you who are curious about them, Omiya Bonsai Art Museum is the place for you. Some of the trees here, such as the Japanese white pine named *"Chiyo-no-Matsu,"* are hundreds of years old, and all of them are carefully looked after by bonsai masters. This museum isn't only limited to bonsai. It also has a collection of artwork and *suiseki* (small stones with naturally beautiful shapes). *About a 5-min walk*

Omiya Bonsai Village

Omiya Bonsai Village was established by bonsai traders who had relocated as a group following the Great Kanto Earthquake (1923). The village is famous among bonsai lovers of the world as a sacred place for bonsai. Even the streets are named after trees like Kaede and Momiji! The Bonsai House of Four Seasons lets you explore the seasons in beautiful surroundings. You can even create your own bonsai in Seikou-en bonsai nursery. There are also English bonsai lessons for visitors.

Unlike many other shrines, however, this one is guarded by stone rabbits, as the word *tsuki* means "moon" in Japanese, and, while some people see a face when they look at the moon, Japanese people see a rabbit! For this reason, rabbits are considered the messengers of the moon, making this a must-visit not just for people who are interested in shrines, but rabbit lovers too!

Kawagoe Area A Window to the Past

Kawagoe offers a glimpse of feudal lord lifestyle at Honmaru Goten among the unique historical buildings on Kurazukuri Zone!

START: JR and Tobu Railwav Kawagoe Station / Seibu Railway Hon-Kawagoe Station

Kita-in Temple

Believed to have been built in the 9th century, Kita-in Temple houses a wealth of history. After the original temple was destroyed in a fire in 1638, several parts of the original Edo Castle were moved here. These include the reception hall and writing alcove. After the historic fires of Edo, the surviving parts of Kita-in Temple stand as a reminder of the great castle.

Kawagoe Hikawa-jinja Shrine

Built about 1500 years ago, Kawagoe Hikawa-jinja Shrine became an important place of worship during the Edo period (1603-1868). Enshrined within are two couples of married gods. For this reason, the shrine is known as a shrine of marriage, where people should go to worship the "deity of matchmaking".

Honmaru Goten (residence) of Kawagoe Castle

Honmaru Goten is the only surviving building of the former Kawagoe Castle. The structure, which was built in 1848, served as the entrance, hall and office of Karo (chief retainer). This unique spot offers a glimpse into the past with cultural details throughout. There's even a life-size doll of a former retainer that adds to the atmosphere.




Kurazukuri Zone: Kawagoe Ichibangai Shopping Street and Bell Tower

Kurazukuri Zone is the most popular place to visit in Kawagoe. Kurazukuri is a unique style of architecture that has been rebuilt after fires decimated the town in 1893. These traditional storehouse buildings remain preserved and are still in use today by many shops. The bell tower known as the Toki-nokane stands over the street at the center of Kurazukuri Zone. The bell's chimes can be heard ringing throughout the area four times a day adding to the atmosphere while visitors shop and sample the local cuisine.

Beyond the major sights, there are still many other things to experience in Kawagoe. Only 10 minutes from Hon-Kawagoe Station is Taisho Roman Dori Street. This charming street features many buildings from the Taisho period (1912-1926) and is a popular shooting location for Japanese television dramas and movies looking to capture that classic atmosphere. *Kashiya Yokocho* (Penny Candy Lane) is another nearby point of interest, especially for those with a sweet tooth. Many Japanese traditional sweets can be purchased at the many shops lining this shopping street. For a more hands-on experience, there are also many workshops held in the area, from glasswork crafts to pottery, that will spark your creativity.

Koedo Kurari

Koedo Kurari, or the Kawagoe City Industry and Tourism Center, was once an old sake cellar used by the Kagamiyama Shuzo Brewery from 1875. It has since been remodeled and now features 34 different breweries from the Saitama area that can be sampled on the premises. The unique system allows customers to buy special tokens that can be used in sake tasting vending machines that distribute the different varieties available! Also available in Koedo Kurai is the rich and colorfully labeled COEDO beer. Each is based off of classic Japanese hues and feature their own flavors.



Japan Brick Manufacturing **Company Former Brick Factory** Facilities

The Japan Brick Manufacturing Company was established by Shibusawa Eiichi and other founders in 1887. It produced the materials for many of Japan's beautiful red-brick buildings, including Tokyo Station and the Kanagawa Prefectural Museum of Cultural History. The factory finally closed its doors in the 2006 and has been converted into a museum full of fascinating information!

Shibusawa Eiichi and the Modernization of Japan

In terms of modernization, Japan has come a long way in a short space of time. Much of that is thanks to Shibusawa Eiichi (1840-1931), who made huge contributions to Japan's economy. Shibusawa Eiichi helped establish nearly 500 companies. Additionally, as a private sector entrepreneur, his work led to friendly Japan-US relations. He was also involved in nearly 600 other projects, such as education, urban planning, and financial support of various medical facilities.

Nagatoro Area A Placid Geographical Journey

Near Chichibu, Nagatoro's natural beauty can be experienced by cruising down the Arakawa River or hiking around Iwadatami.

Nagatoro River Cruise

Anyone seeking a unique way to experience the gorgeous natural surroundings of Nagatoro should check out the Nagatoro River Cruise. A short walk from Nagatoro Station will take you to the river where boatmen steer groups of about 20 passengers down the Arakawa River. Voyager can experience up-close views of the rock cliff faces and foliage bordering the river. While much of the cruise is guite tranguil, there are some lively rapids along the way that should appeal to those looking for a bit of excitement!

Nagatoro Iwadatami Dori **Shopping Street**

This street, which stretches from Nagatoro Station to the Iwadatami rocks, is a popular place to shop as souvenir stalls line the area. If you need to refuel after a day of boating and hiking, try some of the local cuisine at one of the many restaurants. Miso potatoes and miso pork crepes are some of the tasty foods you'll find there.

Nagatoromachi, Chichibu-gun

At the upper part of the Arakawa River is the Nagatoro Valley. This especially scenic area has breathtaking views year-round as the changing seasons offer a varying color palette. In Autumn, vivid reds and oranges blanket the valley, while in the spring, the plum and cherry blossoms line the area. Of particular note are the Iwadatami rocks. These natural formations extend along the river and beckon hikers to traverse their unique structures that have formed over millennia. They present a beautiful contrast with the surrounding greenery.





JR Omiya Station

Take the Shinkansen from Tokyo Station (about 25 min), JR Ueno-Tokyo Line or JR Keihin Tohoku Line (about 40 min), or ride the Shonan-Shinjuku Line from Shinjuku (about 35 min).

JR and Tobu Railway Kawagoe Station

From Tokyo, take the JR Yamanote Line or Tokyo Metro Marunouchi Line to Ikebukuro Station (about 25 min). Then transfer to the Tobu Tojo Line (about 35 min) or the JR Kawagoe Line and Saikyo Line (about 55 min) bound for Kawagoe Station.

Seibu Railway Hon-Kawagoe Station

Take the limited express train from Seibu-Shinjuku Station (about 45 min).

JR Fukaya Station

From Tokyo Station take the JR Ueno-Tokyo Line (about 90 min).

Tobu Railway Wakoshi Station

From Tokyo Station, take the Tokyo Metro Marunouchi Line to Ikebukuro Station (about 20 min). Then transfer to the Yurakucho Line bound for Wakoshi Station (about 20 min), or transfer to the Tobu Tojo Line bound for Wakoshi Station (about 15 min).

Seibu Railway Seibu-Chichibu Station

From Tokyo Station, take the JR Yamanote Line or the Tokyo Metro Marunouchi Line to Ikebukuro Station (about 25 min). Then transfer to the Seibu Line and take a limited express train bound for Seibu-Chichibu Station (about 80 min).

JR Kumagaya Station

Take the Shinkansen from Tokyo Station (about 40 min) or the JR Ueno-Tokyo Line (about 70 min).
